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Executive Summary

The *St. Adalbert Parish Life Survey* was designed by the Center for Applied Research in the Apostolate (CARA) at Georgetown University. Most of the questions were derived from CARA's database of nationally tested questions, with some questions designed specifically for the parish. The parish distributed the hard copy of the survey to those attending its liturgies over a weekend in May 2025, with the parish also distributing a link to an identical online version of the survey in May and June. In all, there were 414 valid responses, with one additional respondent under age 16 not included in the analysis. Eighty-two percent of responses were online and 18% were to the paper version of the survey. Following standard assumptions of statistical inference, a sample size of 414 provides a margin of error of approximately ±4.8 percentage points.

Characteristics of Respondents

- In calendar year 2025, the average age of valid respondents to the in-pew and online surveys at St. Adalbert Parish is 51. Half are 56 or younger.
- Parishioners fall into these three age groups: younger adults ages 16 to 35 (30%), adults ages 36 to 64 (39%), and older adults ages 65 and older (31%).
- Fifty-five percent of respondents to the survey are female and 45% are male. Sixty-five percent say they are currently married or remarried. Some 23% have never married, 5% are divorced or separated, and 6% are widowed. Twenty-seven percent report having at least one child or stepchild under age 18 living with them.
- Some 8% have attained a high school diploma or less, 23% have attended some college or have an associate's degree, and 69% have a bachelor's or graduate degree.
- On average, respondents have attended the parish for 14 years, with half having attended five years or more.

• Some 77% identify the parish as their primary place of worship *and* say they are registered there. Nine percent say they regularly attend the parish but are *not* registered there, 8% are registered at the parish but say it is *not* their primary place of worship, and another 6% were identified as visitors on the weekend of the survey.

Assessment of Parish Life and Needs

- The reasons most commonly given for what "very much" attracts them to come to the parish are the quality of the liturgy (84%), the beauty of the church (82%), the quality of the music (75%), and the quality of the preaching (65%).
- Examining the three evaluative sections of the survey (with parishioners rating these areas of parish life as "poor," "fair," "good," or "excellent), some of the greatest strengths of the parish can be identified. Examining these evaluative items, these four (many of which are related to worship) are the most likely to receive an "excellent" rating and so can be seen as areas of strength:
 - o Music at Mass 79% rate it as "excellent"
 - Masses and liturgies in general 72%
 - o Cor Jesu Adoration and penance service 70%
 - Prayerful, reverent atmosphere at Mass 68%
- Using the same process, some of the areas most in need of improvement at the parish can also be identified. The areas *least* likely to receive "excellent" evaluations are mostly related to parish outreach efforts:
 - Sacramental preparation programs for youth 24% rate it as "excellent"
 - Parish outreach to those sick or homebound 23%
 - Parish outreach to single adults 22%
 - Parish outreach to married couples 17%
 - Parish outreach to senior citizens 11%
 - Parish outreach to those divorced or separated 11%
- When asked how much priority the parish should give to 13 areas of need, between two-fifths to three-fifths indicate that these areas that should be given "very much" priority:
 - o Fostering priestly or religious vocations 57% give this "very much" priority
 - Developing a parish sense of community 57%
 - Social activities and opportunities to meet new people 50%
 - o Programs to help parishioners develop their prayer life and interior spirituality 46%
 - Young adult ministry 46%
- When asked how interested they are in learning more about seven different topics, about half to three-fifths identify the following as topics they are "very" interested in:
 - History and traditions of the Church 58% are "very" interested in learning more
 - Personal prayer and spirituality 56%
 - Meaning behind the rituals in Mass 55%
 - o Biblical study and interpretation 49%
 - o Catholic moral theology 48%

• Respondents on the online survey were asked, if Mass times were to be adjusted, which one Sunday Mass schedule would they prefer. Regardless of the age group, a majority (53% to 59%) prefer an 8:30 am and 10:30 am Sunday Mass schedule.

Greater Involvement in Parish Life

- Parishioners were asked how often they participate in functions at the parish: 61% say they attend parish events other than Mass once a month or more often and 51% say they volunteer for a parish ministry or activity as often.
- Asked what prevents them from being more involved in parish ministries and activities, parishioners are most likely to say that their busy schedules or lack of time (58%) and inconvenient times for programs (40%) "somewhat" or "very much" prevent it.
- When asked when during a typical week they are regularly most available to participate in parish activities (such as committees and adult education), a majority of those of all age groups (53% to 67%) say they are regularly most available on weekday evenings.
- Seven in ten "very much" agree that they contribute financially to the parish (70%). When asked what prevents them from contributing more financially, more than half say their current financial status or debts (55%) "somewhat" or "very much" prevents them. In addition, just under two in five say these prevent them: not being aware of how the parish spends its money (39%), their support of other causes (38%), and not being aware of the parish's needs (35%).

Introduction

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Interpreting This Report

Most of the questions in this survey use four-point response scales (i.e., "not at all," "only a little," "somewhat," "very much"; or "poor," "fair," "good," "excellent"). These scales allow respondents to choose between two relatively "negative" choices (e.g., "poor" and "fair") and two relatively "positive" choices (e.g., "good" and "excellent"). In parts of the analysis in this report, these responses are combined to allow for clearer comparisons. However, as sometimes examining the most positive response distinguishes important contrasts in level of support, those responses are presented separately.

In addition, readers may also wish to compare the difference between the two extreme responses, say "poor" and "excellent," to compare the level of intensity with which opposing opinions are held. These comparisons and others may be drawn by referring to the actual

¹ Strictly speaking, it is necessary to know the total population (in this case, the total number of adult parishioners) to calculate margin of error. CARA's standard assumption for its in-pew parish surveys is that about half of parishioners are represented. For obvious reasons, those who are represented in a given in-pew survey are disproportionately more frequent Mass attenders.

percentage responses given in Appendix I. That appendix shows the percentage responses for each item, calculated out of 100%, as well as the percentage of all respondents that did not respond to each question, separately calculated out of 100% for clarity of comparison.

In addition to summarizing the responses to most questions for respondents as a whole, the report also compares the responses of those from selected subgroups. The first section of the report describes the characteristics of the respondents as well as the subgroups that are used in the analyses that follow. Throughout the report, the tables and charts that compare differences between and among these various subgroups are presented following the responses for parishioners as a whole in each section.


The margin of error for *differences between subgroups*, such as the differences among those of different age groups or those with different levels of involvement, depends on the size of the subgroups being compared. Unless otherwise noted, all subgroup differences described in the graphs of this report are statistically significant: that is, they pass standard tests of statistical inference and can be considered to be "real" differences. In some instances, differences between or among subgroups that are not statistically significant are also noted. These differences should be treated as merely suggestive of real differences that may exist between the subgroups under consideration.

In addition to the quantitative data analyzed in this report, eight open-ended questions on the survey collected qualitative data. For these data, respondents were prompted with a question and given an open box for written comments, rather than select from a set of response options. As the parish has opted to analyze these comments, no analysis is presented in this report.

The results of this survey fairly represent the characteristics and attitudes of people ages 16 or older who attend Mass at St. Adalbert Parish. It cannot be used to make inferences about populations outside of Mass attendees at the parish. Further, it is not representative of those who do not attend Mass or those who are only involved in parish functions excluding Mass.

Method of Response

Among the 414 valid responses, 82% responded to the survey online and 18% responded to the paper survey.



Section I: Demographic Characteristics of Respondents

This section of the report includes demographic and other descriptive data for the 414 valid respondents to this survey. These data may be helpful in considering who responded to the survey, which populations are represented in the data, and characteristics of those attending Mass on a typical weekend at the parish.

Age


Valid respondents at St. Adalbert Parish surveyed in 2025 were born between 1936 and 2009.² The average age of respondents is 51, with half saying they are age 56 or younger. The most common age range reported is 60 to 69 (24%).

Age Groups


Important differences between groups in parishes are typically found among those who belong to different age groups. CARA divides Catholics into the three age groups presented in the figure below. The most common age group among St. Adalbert respondents is those ages 36 to 64 (39%).




These three age groups will be used for comparisons throughout the rest of the report.

Gender and Marital Status

More than half (55%) of respondents identify as female and 45% as male.³



Sixty-five percent of respondents are currently married or remarried. Some 23% have never married, 5% are divorced or separated, and 6% are widowed.

Differences by Age Groups

Female respondents are particularly likely to be ages 65 and older (63%). Marital status also differs some by age group, with those ages 16 to 35 most likely to have never married (57%)' those ages 36 to 64 most likely to be married or remarried (80%), and those ages 65 and older most likely to be widowed (17%).

Children or Stepchildren Living in the Household

Just over a quarter report having children or stepchildren under age 18 living with them (27%). Those ages 36 to 64 (40%) are most likely to have children living with them, followed by those ages 16 to 35 (33%) and those ages 65 and older (5%).

ZIP Codes

Asked to write in their local ZIP code, respondents are most likely to have identified 49504, 49534, 49505, and 49503. ⁴ Together, these ZIP codes contain 57% of all respondents at the parish.



Level of Education

Eight percent have a high school diploma or less. Another 23% have attended some college or have an associate's degree. Some 69% report having a bachelor's or graduate degree.⁵


Differences by Age Groups

Level of education differs some by age group. Those ages 36 to 64 most likely to have a bachelor's or graduate degree (80%), with those ages 65 and older least likely (55%).

Level of Household Income

St. Adalbert respondents were asked to identify the category that best described their total annual household incomes, including all of those living with them. Twenty-three percent report household incomes of less than \$50,000 and another 29% report having between \$50,000 and \$99,999. Some 23% say their household income is \$100,000 to \$149,999 and 25% report having an income of \$150,000 or more.⁶

Differences by Age Group

Income level differs some by age group. Those ages 36 to 64 are most likely to report annual household incomes of \$100,000 or more (66%), and those ages 65 and older are most likely to report annual household incomes of less than 100,000 (67%).



Section II: Religious Characteristics of Respondents

This part of the report describes several characteristics of the 414 valid respondents to the survey that relate to their religious attributes and parish-related behaviors.

Relationship to the Catholic Church

About three-fifths of St. Adalbert respondents say they have been active Catholics since birth (63%), with 13% saying they are returned Catholics and 23% identifying as converts to Catholicism. Less than 1% say they are inactive Catholics and 1% are non-Catholics. ⁷





Relationship to the Parish

Among all respondents, 86% report that St. Adalbert Parish is their primary place of worship and 85% say they are registered there.⁸

In the figure below, those two measures are examined in relationship to one another. Three in four (77%) say both that the parish is their primary place of worship *and* that they are registered there. Fewer, 9%, say the parish is their primary place of worship but that they are *not* registered there. Eight percent say the parish is not their primary place of worship but that they are registered there. Six percent are visitors to the parish.

Years at the Parish


Mass attenders were asked to write in the number of years they have attended the parish, with those visiting the parish asked to leave this question blank. On average, respondents have attended the parish for 14 years. The median is five years, meaning that half of respondents have attended for five years or less.⁹

Mass Regularly Attended

Respondents were invited to identify the one Mass they most regularly attend at the parish. The most commonly chosen Masses were the 11 am Sunday (38%) and 9 am Sunday (35%) Masses. Some 8% say they do *not* regularly attend Mass at the parish. ¹⁰





Frequency of Mass Attendance

Some 86% of respondents report attending Mass at least once a week. 11 An additional 7% attend one to three times a month and 1% attend every few months. Six percent attend less frequently than that. 1213





Frequency of Confession or Reconciliation

Some 75% of respondents report going to Confession/Reconciliation at least once a year. On the other end of the scale, 25% report "never or rarely" going.¹⁴



Differences by Age Groups

Those ages 16 to 35 (88%) are most likely to go to Confession/Reconciliation at least once a year, followed by those ages 36 to 64 (74%), and those ages 65 and older (62%).

Frequency of Other Religious Behaviors

Respondents were asked how often they engage in a variety of religious behaviors, with the findings summarized in the table below. By far, they most frequently pray or have a conversation with God, which 91% report doing more than once a week. 15

- Examining the time frame of once a week or more, responding parishioners are most likely to report praying or having a conversation with God (96%).
- Half to three-fifths report attending parish events other than Mass (61%), volunteering for a parish ministry or activity (51%), and offering their time and talents in volunteer opportunities at some place other than the parish (51%) once a month or more.
- Half report volunteering for a parish ministry or activity (49%), and offering their time and talents in volunteer opportunities at some place other than the parish (49%) twice a year or less.

Section III: Assessment of Parish Life and Needs

Overall, the results of the St. Adalbert Parish Life Survey are very positive. Thirteen particular areas were addressed in the survey instrument. These areas are featured in this section of the report, though readers are advised to consult the response frequencies in Appendix I of this document for response rates and other pertinent information about these data.

The areas of parish life addressed are:

- Evaluation of Aspects of Parish Life
- Evaluation of Faith Formation Programs
- Evaluation of Parish Outreach
- Attraction to the Parish
- Importance of Religious Behaviors
- Importance of Church Teachings
- Interest in Learning More about Topics
- Priority for Parish Needs
- Preferred Sunday Mass Schedule
- Impediments to Contributing More Financially to the Parish
- Impediments to Being More Involved in Parish Ministries and Activities
- Times of the Week Available
- Attitudes about Parish Life and Stewardship

Evaluation of Aspects of Parish Life

This section presents some of the survey's most general evaluation of parish life, evaluating these very general measures of CARA's seven elements of parish life: community, worship, faith formation, and stewardship. Respondents were asked to evaluate each aspect of parish life, rating each "poor," fair," "good," or "excellent." ¹⁹ The first column of numbers in the table below summarizes the positive side of the findings, showing the percentage that rated each aspect "good" and "excellent" combined. The final column shows those who rated an aspect as "excellent." ²⁰

More than four in five respondents (81% to 97%) give a positive rating ("good" and "excellent" combined) to each of the aspects of parish life shown in the table below. They are most likely to give a positive rating to Masses and liturgies (97%) and Cor Jesu – Adoration and penance service (97%).

- Examining the percentages in that final column only, about two-thirds to four-fifths give an "excellent" rating to these four aspects of parish life:
 - Music at Mass 79%

o Masses and liturgies in general – 72%

- Cor Jesu Adoration and penance service 70%
- o Prayerful, reverent atmosphere at Mass 68%



- About a third to two-fifths rate these aspects as "excellent":
 - Hospitality or sense of welcome at Mass 43%
 - \circ Efforts to educate parishioners in the faith -37%
 - o Encouragement to share your time, talents and treasure with the parish 34%
 - Management of parish finances 33%
- The sense of community within the parish (26%) receives an "excellent" from a quarter of respondents.

Differences by Age Groups


"Good" and "Excellent" Ratings Combined

Those ages 65 and older are most likely to evaluate the two aspects of parish life presented in the figure below as "good" or "excellent."




"Excellent" Ratings Only

The younger the age group, the more likely its members are to give an "excellent" rating to the two worship-related aspects of parish life presented in the figure below.




Those ages 36 and older are especially likely to evaluate the aspects of parish life presented in the figure below as "excellent."



Differences by Mass Usually Attended

Those who usually attend the 11 am Sunday Mass are especially likely to give the prayerful, reverent atmosphere at Mass an "excellent" rating. Usual attenders of the 9 am Sunday Mass, on the other hand, are relatively *less* likely to rate the hospitality or sense of welcome that highly.



Evaluation of Faith Formation Programs

Respondents were asked to evaluate some parish faith formation programs. As in the previous subsection, respondents were asked to evaluate each staff member or program, rating each "poor," fair," "good," or "excellent." ²¹ The first column of numbers in the table below summarizes the positive side of the findings, showing the percentage that rated each aspect "good" or "excellent" combined. The final column displays the percentage rating each person or program as "excellent."

More than seven-tenths rate each of the faith formation programs in the table below positively ("good" and "excellent" combined). They are most likely to rate the OCIA (92%) and marriage preparation (84%) programs positively.


- More than half rate OCIA (54%) as "excellent."
- Marriage preparation (35%) receives an "excellent" evaluation from more than a third.
- About a quarter say faith formation for adults (26%) and sacramental preparation programs for youth (24%) as "excellent."

Differences by Age Groups

The older the age group, the more likely its members are to give an "excellent" rating to marriage preparation at the parish. Those ages 65 and older are also most likely to evaluate faith formation for adults as "excellent."



Evaluation of Parish Outreach

Parishioners were asked to evaluate how well the parish reaches out to various groups. As in the previous subsection, respondents were asked to evaluate parish outreach to each group, rating each "poor," fair," "good," or "excellent." The first column of numbers in the table below summarizes the positive side of the findings, showing the percentage that rated outreach to each group as "good" or "excellent" combined. The final column displays the percentage rating outreach to each group as "excellent." 22

About half to three-fourths say parish outreach is "good" or "excellent" to young adults (75%), single adults (62%), those sick or homebound (59%), and married couples (53%). Less than half give a positive evaluation to outreach to senior citizens (47%) and those divorced or separated (40%).

- A third rate outreach to young adults as "excellent" (33%).
- Roughly one in five rates as "excellent" outreach to those sick or homebound (23%), single adults (22%), and married couples (17%).
- Parish outreach to senior citizens (11%) and those divorced or separated (11%) receives an "excellent" evaluation from one in ten respondents.

Non-response Rate


Perhaps due to being unfamiliar with parish outreach efforts to some groups, non-response rates are high for some groups. They are at least half for outreach to the following groups:

- 76% for divorced or separated
- 72% for sick or homebound
- 58% for single adults
- 54% for senior citizens

While it is impossible to know why a respondent did not provide a response to a question, these high non-response rates might be suggestive that the parish has not made these outreach programs well known.

Differences by Age Group

Those ages 18 to 35 are *less* likely than others to give an "excellent" evaluation to parish outreach to young adults, with 27% of those of that age group rating it that highly.








Married respondents are *less* likely than others to give an "excellent" evaluation to parish outreach to married couples, with 48% of married respondents rating it that highly.












"Somewhat" or "Very" Interested


"Very" Interested Only


















"Very Much" Agree Only
